What was the challenge?


In 2015 Austria and the 192 other member states of the United Nations committed to pursuing the 17 Sustainable Development Goals. They encompass social, ecological and economic aspects and are part of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. The fifth goal is called "Gender equality achieving gender equality and empowering all women and girls to self-determination" with the fourth sub-goal titled "Recognize and value unpaid care and domestic work through the provision of public services, infrastructure and social protection policies and the promotion of shared responsibility within the household and the family as nationally appropriate." The data in this regard is recorded under the indicator "Proportion of time spent on unpaid domestic and care work, by sex, age and location".


What was the solution?


What was the effect?


